We have found that working with 2,600+ individuals during the year brings us great stories about their experiences and relationships they form with our partner agency staff, other volunteers, clients and the community with their on-going and short-term volunteer assignments.

This is also true of the one-day volunteer projects we have available which can include; helping at a blood mobile, a fundraiser, registering participants at area races/walks, taking tickets at short-run theatrical performances or food distribution.

About 50 such opportunities are offered each year and we have over 400 individuals that enjoy the one-day volunteer opportunities.
