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Eager to Make a Difference Peter Daly

As a 2016 Walsh University graduate and headed to John Carroll University for his Master's Degree, Peter Daly wanted to involve himself in his community. He did some research and discovered the Greater Cleveland Volunteers website and scoured the list of incredible opportunities available to help him begin his journey. He was amazed at having "all these options all in one place, and having those connections." He submitted his resume online and attended a Greater Cleveland Volunteers information session, where he chose Empowering Youth Empowering Justice (EYEJ).



EYEJ 's mission is to "empower and amplify the voices of teens and pre-teens by bridging them with diverse individuals to engage in interactive discussions centered around social justice." EYEJ provides a discussion series to the Cleveland Metropolitan School District with monthly topics that benefit both the audience and the presenters. The organization sets up the curriculum for 6th to 12th graders. Says Pete, "Many want to give information they wish they had as youth." If the speakers are not fluent in an issue, EYEJ pairs them with experts.

Pete volunteers about 5 hours a week at EYEJ's office. "My responsibility in volves preparing the materials for the discussion series; making copies, modify ing documents, bringing supplies, as well as handing out and collecting volun-

teer registrations and feedback surveys before and after the discussion. In addition to this, each month I take the minutes that were recorded from each classroom and compile them into a report. -

"Volunteering has taught me how to talk with people," Peter says. He is now able to network with those in careers that align with his educational goal of studying psychology and becoming a licensed counselor. Says Peter, "It is a learning experience that is significant and powerful." A person does not need to be retired to be with the Greater Cleveland Volunteers. "You'd be surprised by what's out there in terms of volunteering," Peter concludes. "All these options are in one place; every given thing you want to do is there."
