AARP Foundation Experience Corps is a proven national program with volunteers who are dedicated to helping children in grades K-3 become great readers before finishing third grade.

This program is for adults age 50+, who possesses a high school diploma or GED, agree to take and passes a criminal background check and can volunteer 4-6 hours per week.

This year we offer the program in both the Cleveland Metropolitan and Euclid City School Districts.

My Mentor My Friend is a lunchtime mentoring program starting with 4th grade students in the Cleveland Metropolitan School District.

Adults are matched with students to share lunchtime by talking, doing puzzles, making crafts, playing board games or exploring a new skill or hobby. The mentors, age 18+, visit their assigned school once or twice a week, depending on their schedule.
